TIPS FOR SAFE STORAGE

- Don't store your medications in your bathroom.
- Lock up opioid medications in a locking bag, locking prescription bottle, locking cabinet, or safe.
- Keep the key or combination to your locking device in a different location from your prescriptions to discourage theft and misuse.
- Find safe storage devices online or at hardware stores or drug stores.

KNOW THE FACTS

What is an Opioid?

Opioids are a specific class of drugs commonly used to reduce pain.

Opioids prescribed by doctors include oxycodone, hydrocodone, codeine, morphine, fentanyl, and others. Heroin and illicitly manufactured fentanyl are also opioids.

Opioids can negatively affect the reward center in the brain. Over time, a user may need more and more, making these drugs highly addictive.²

YOUR INFLUENCE MATTERS

Lock up opioid medications in a locking bag, locking prescription bottle, locking cabinet, or safe.

Dispose of leftover or unused medication at a safe disposal site near you or by ordering a free mail-back envelope.
